



# THE FIGHT FOR MANSTON AIRPORT IS NOT OVER!



**T**his Battle of Britain airport is just 40 minutes' drive from Medway. It has the tenth longest civilian runway in the UK (9,016ft) and is capable of handling some of the largest long-haul aircraft to grace the skies.

In November 2013, it was purchased by Stagecoach tycoon Ann Gloag with a promise to keep it operating for at least two years. However, she announced plans for its closure four months later, and the Airport ceased operations on 15<sup>th</sup> May 2014 with the loss of 144 jobs.

Since then, the Airport was "sold" to so-called regeneration specialists Trevor Cartner and Joseph (Christopher) Musgrave, who have submitted an outline planning application for at least 2,500 homes on the site, as well as a "mixed-use development". The Airport is still designated as an Airport for planning purposes. The owners have attempted to get planning permission for change of use, which was refused, and has now gone to the Planning Inspectorate for appeal.

RiverOak, an American investment company, are working with the Planning Inspectorate to create a Development Consent Order (DCO), a process designed to fast-track proposals considered to be nationally significant infrastructure projects. The plan is to get Manston Airport re-opened as an operational airport.
